TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT JULY 11, 2022 SELECT BOARD MEETING

REPORTING PERIOD

The reporting period is from June 28, 2022 through July 8, 2022

Finance

The new budget year has begun, the FY22 budget will remain open until August to pay the remainder of expenses received.

Police

Chief Mone has been working on the department's upcoming CIP presentation. The department is planning for the August move to the temporary facilities. They have just finished the background for a candidate to fill an open position.

Fire

The Fire Department has also been preparing their CIP presentation and prepping for the move. Chief Lajoie has an ad out to fill a vacant position and will notify the Board when action is required.

Facilities

Town Hall. Nothing new to report. I have begun a project to have the ceiling of the Town Hall insulated and a small cat walk installed. With the expected rise in heating fuel this winter this project should pay for itself quickly.

New Town Office/Fire/Police Buildings. Plans are well under way for the August move. Radio and computer consultants are ordering needed supplies and fit ups to the temporary space will begin shortly. Floor plans for the new buildings are being finalized with PCG and Two-way assisting with needed equipment drops.

Stone Building. Nothing new to report. The contractor has scheduled the flashing repair for the third week of June. This could change depending on weather.

Town Office/Chevalier Building. Nothing new to report.

Recreation

Adult softball is well underway.

Summer camp is running smoothly with multiple trips planned for the children throughout the summer

Plans for Old Home Day August 13th and the kickoff event on August 12th are well underway.

Building Department

The new building Inspector, Jared Shaheen, has begun full time employment. Jared comes to us from the Town of Northwood NH and brings knowledge in both the construction trade and inspection.

Highway

DPW is prepping for summer paving projects. Director Hubbard will notify residents in affected areas. They are still looking for someone to handle Saturdays at the Brush facility. Please contact Director Hubbard if interested.

Projects

Route 1 Culvert. There is an item on the agenda to discuss the condition report received from DOT

PFAS Investigation. Paperwork is being completed to finalize the grant. The project to install the water line will be scheduled for this fall.

Trash Collection. Nothing new to report. I have been researching the positives, negatives and possibilities of the Town going out to bid for Town-wide trash collection. This would mean the price will be included in the tax rate paid by residents. Initial research shows the overall cost could be less to each resident. I am waiting on current customer information and will bring it forward for a discussion as soon as the initial information gathering is completed.

Revaluation. Nothing new to report. MRI has been notified that their bid was chosen for the contract. That will be scheduled for next spring.

Cell Tower. Nothing new to report. Work continues in the search for a suitable location for a cell tower. I will brief the Board when the issue requires action on their part.

Walkway Project. Nothing new to report. This project will be completed after the buildings have been constructed. This alleviates the chance of damage during construction.

Coakley Landfill Group. Nothing new to report. The group had a meeting on June 16th, I was in attendance and will plan to attend the next meeting when scheduled.

Junkyard Closures and/or New Problems: Nothing new to report. We are seeing some improvement with vehicles pulling off of Route 1 for deliveries. The Police have visited dealerships in Town and have issued Summonses to violators.

Rails to Trails. Nothing new to report. Mr. Sununu has been working with RPC on sub-committees for signage and other aspects. A meeting will be scheduled when a quorum can be sat.

CIP. Department heads have been preparing for CIP and meetings have been scheduled for July 15th and July 22nd.

Seacoast Private Well Initiative. Nothing new to report. The sub-committee has met and discussed the program. They have researched including PFAS testing and are currently working on how it can be financially included in the project.

Meeting Schedule: Our next regularly scheduled meeting is on July 25, 2022.

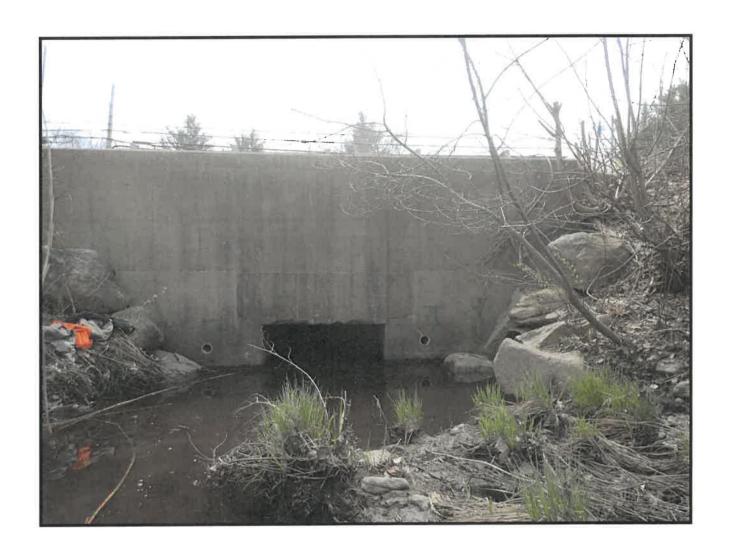

Culvert Inspection Report:

Location: U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road) over Little River

Locale: North Hampton, NH Purpose: Culvert Investigation Date: 4/25/2022 Inspector: Matthew Greer, PE Inspector: Andrew Gradeski, PE

Introduction:

Following the identification of a sink hole adjacent to the west headwall of the culvert conveying Little River below U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road) in North Hampton, NH, WSP was tasked with performing an investigation as to the cause of the sink hole and the severity of the condition. WSP personnel performed the site visit on April 25, 2022. The weather conditions at the time of the site visit were partly cloudy skies with a temperature of approximately 55° F. The entire length of the culvert and both headwalls were able to be inspected.

WSP performed the inspection within the culvert utilizing chest waders, probing rods and tape measures. Probing was performed to determine if any undermining was present and if any silty or soft materials have settled in previously undermined areas. Inspection of the top side of the structure was performed from within the roadway utilizing a buddy – lookout system to ensure safety in the live traffic lanes. In addition to the structural and safety inspection of the structure, approximate measurements of the culvert and roadway dimensions were taken.

The culvert conveying Little River below U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road) is comprised of granite slabs supported by mortared granite and stone abutments with three-sided reinforced concrete extensions at both the east and west ends. Reinforced concrete headwalls are present at the east and west ends of the culvert to retain fill. A natural stream bed is present within the culvert consisting largely of small to medium sized stones and sand. U.S. Route 1 carries three (3) lanes of traffic over the structure, one (1) lane servicing northbound traffic, one (1) lane servicing southbound traffic and the final central lane serving as a shared left hand turn lane. All directional conventions within this report are relative to the direction of travel on U.S. Route 1. Little River flows from west to east.

General Condition of the Structure:

Both the east and west headwalls exhibit a few scattered hairline cracks, most of which along the east headwall have light efflorescence and there are areas of light scaling present throughout (Photos 7 and 8). The east headwall appears to be plumb, the west headwall is leaning outward 3.5° and the fill depth is estimated to be approximately 7.0′. The masonry abutments within the main stone portion of the culvert have scattered areas of cracked and missing mortar, scattered missing chink stones and a few areas with evidence of slight settlement (Photos 9, 10, 12, 13, 15, 16, 18 and 19). The north and south concrete walls of the concrete extensions exhibit isolated hairline cracks (Photos 21 and 22).

The granite roof slabs are missing the majority of their mortar and several of the chink stones. At the locations of missing mortar/chink stones, minor penetrations into the roof of the culvert were observed. Isolated evidence of minor leakage was observed from the roof slabs within the culvert (Photos 11, 14, 17 and 20). Heavier evidence of leakage and water penetration was noted near the west end of the masonry portion of the culvert. Approximately 21.0' from the east end of the culvert, a granite roof slab has rotated and the lowest corner is approximately 8" lower than the adjacent stone, penetrations of up

to 30" into the roof of the culvert were measured at this location (**Photo 24**). The roof within the concrete extensions was generally in good condition (**Photo 23**). None of the noted settlement or rotated stones appear to have been recent.

The asphalt roadway over the structure was generally in good condition, displaying no evidence of settlement. There were a few areas of minor cracking most prevalent along the northbound edge of travel way line (Photo 2). The rip rap placed between the west guardrail and the west headwall did not display any evidence of active settlement (Photo 4).

Specific Findings:

At the west most granite roof slab of the masonry culvert, there is a void at the east side of the slab measuring full length x 6" wide x up to 24" deep (Photo 26). There is also a void at the west side of this slab (intersection with concrete extension) at the south abutment measuring 45" deep in the south direction and up to 40" deep in the vertical direction (Photos 27 to 29). The underside of the granite slab was wet at this location and there was accumulation of small stones/gravel within the culvert channel measuring approximately 7" higher than the adjacent channel bed x 24" wide x an approximate 10.0' length along the culvert. These findings are indicative of fill spilling through the roof of the culvert. This area is located approximately 7.0' from the west end of the culvert and 9.0' from the west edge of the roadway.

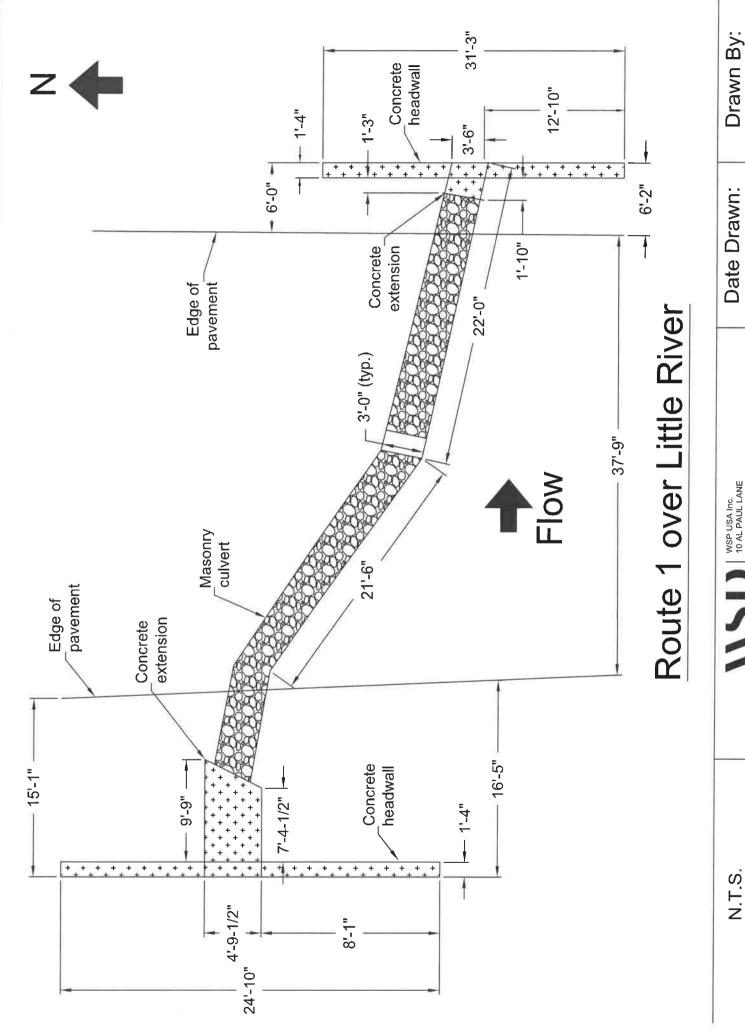
The north and south walls of the west concrete extension and the portions of the headwall north and south of the opening were found to be severely undermined (Refer to the attached sketch for details). Note at this location the hydraulic opening transitions abruptly from approximately 4.8' wide within the concrete portion to the nominal 3.0' width of the masonry culvert. There was no evidence of a footing or piles at this extension. Immediately upstream of the inlet there is a scour pocket within the streambed measuring 13" deep for the entire width of the culvert opening.

There is no apparent additional settlement at the areas of the west embankment headwall areas where rip rap has been placed (**Photo 4**). At the west guardrail, 9^{th} post from the south end of the rail there is an area of erosion, which has been filled with rip rap, measuring 41" long x 39" wide x up to 8" deep that undermines the edge of the asphalt for a 41" length x up to 4-1/2" deep (**Photos 30 and 31**).

At the south end of the southwest wingwall (west headwall) there is a void measuring 10" deep (east direction) x 22" high x 11" long (south direction) with evidence of minor fill spilling through (Photo 32). The west headwall is 3.5° out-of-plumb, leaning away from the roadway. North of the west headwall, there is an erosion gully measuring full height of the sloped portion of the embankment x 12" wide x 16" deep (Photo 33)

Recommendations:

- Remedy areas of undermining at the west concrete extension with considerations for smoothing the transition from the west concrete extension to the masonry culvert.
- Remedy the area of undermining at the west edge of asphalt.
- Monitor the tilt of the west concrete extension and condition of rip rap placed at the west embankment.



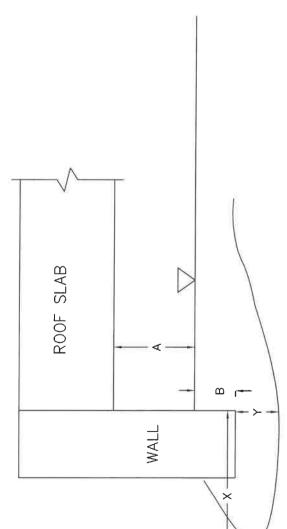

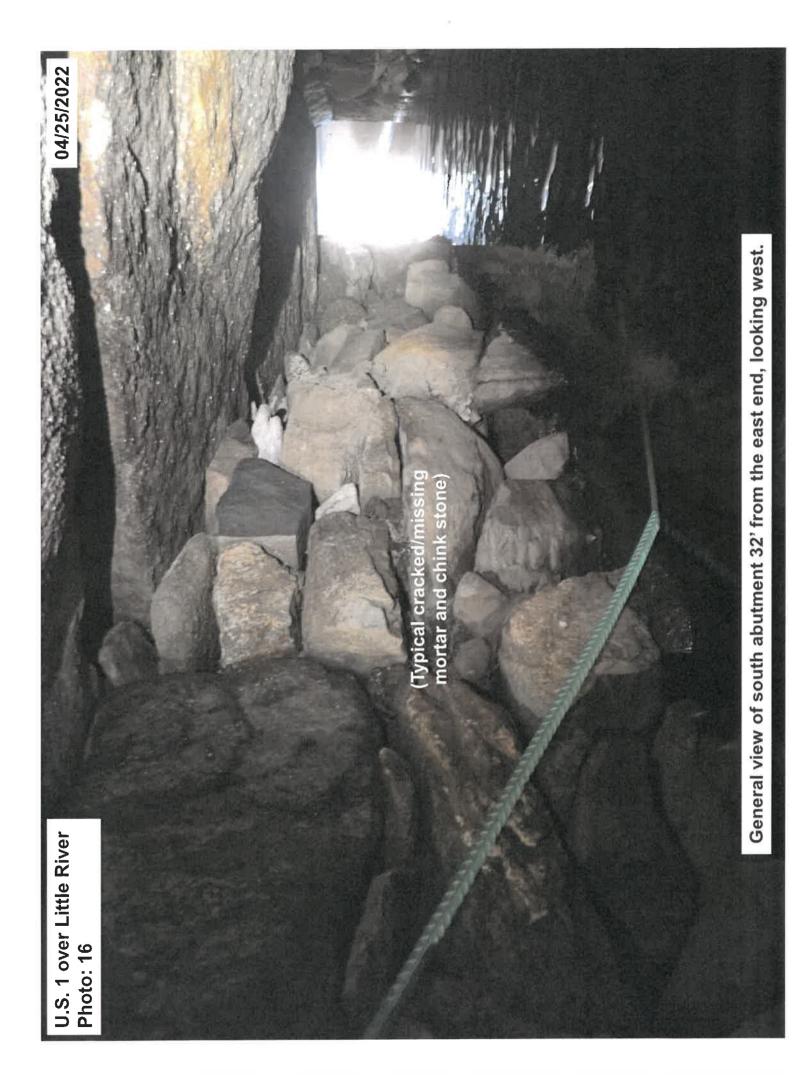


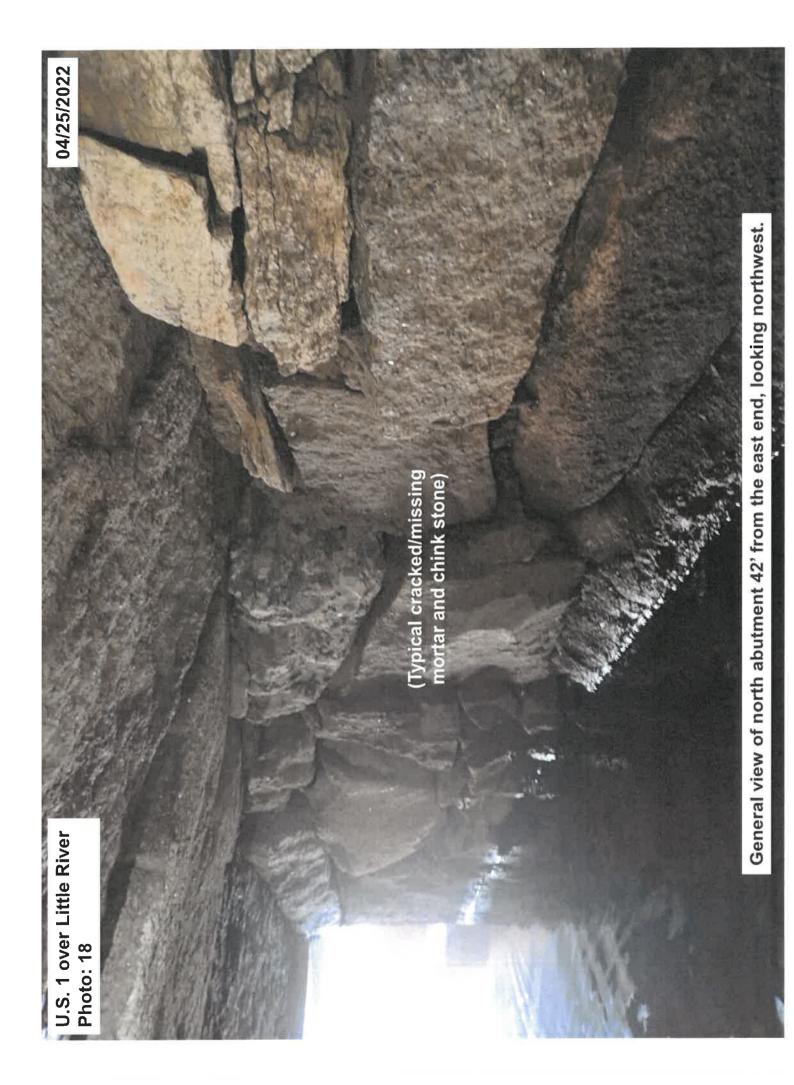












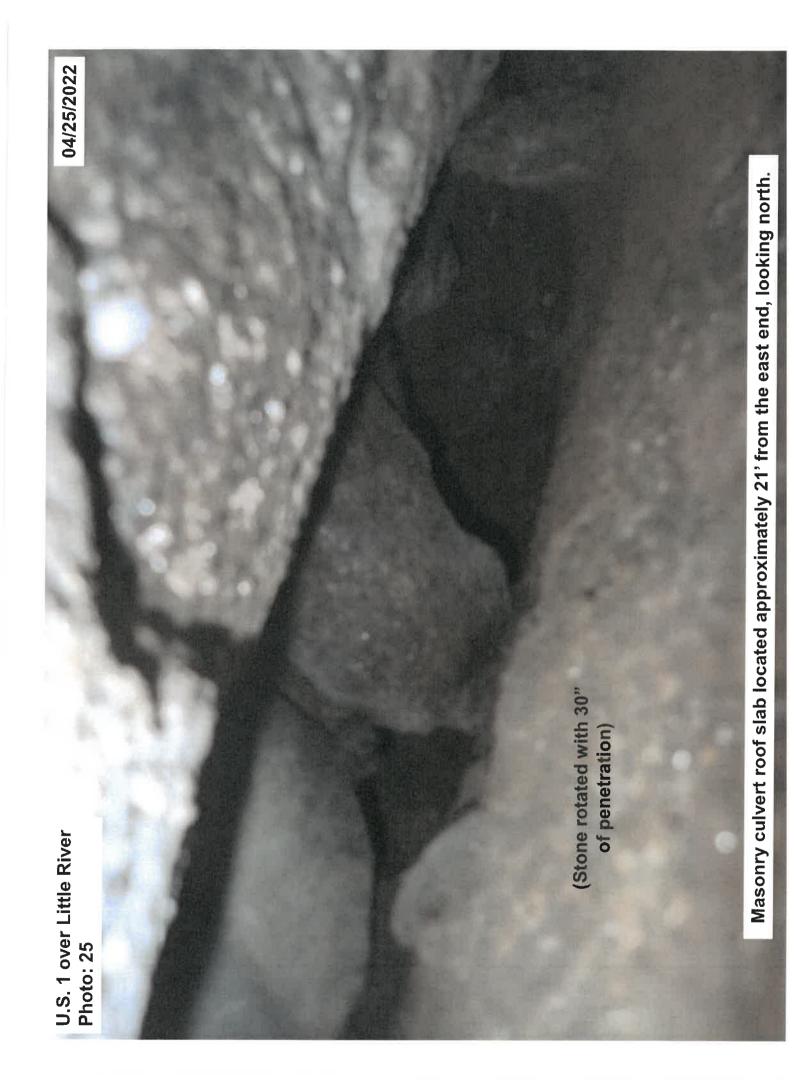
U.S. 1 over Little River

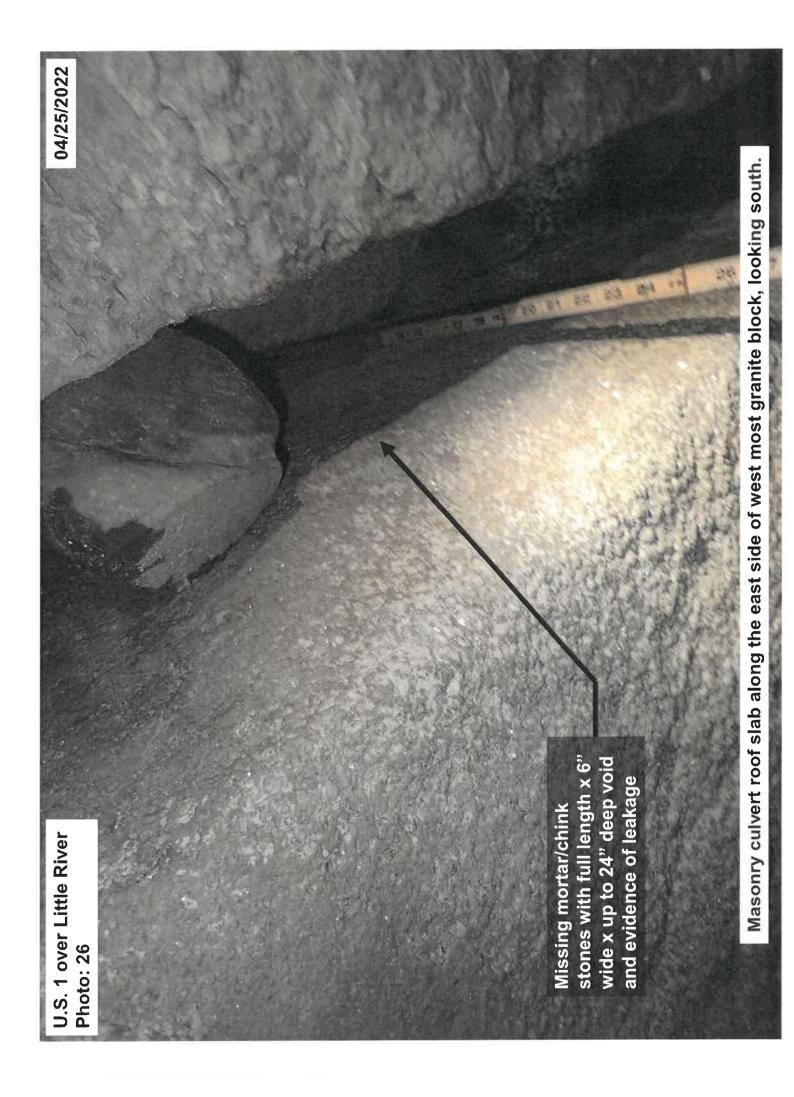

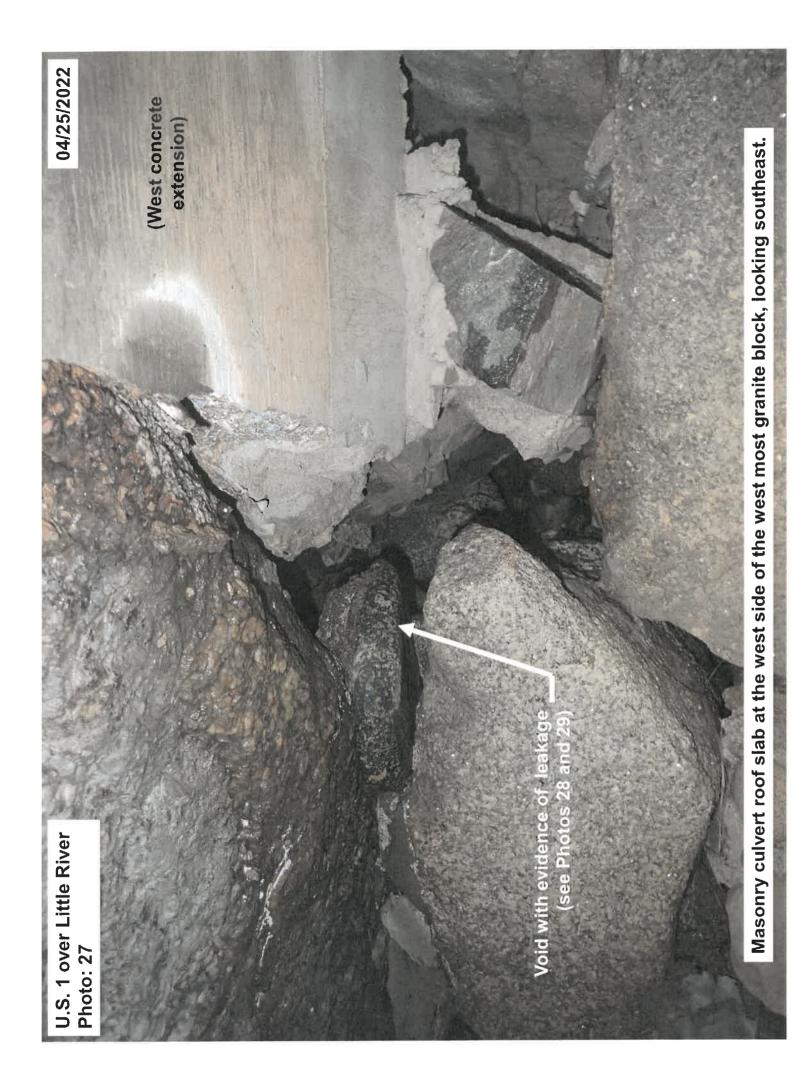

General view of the west concrete extension north wall, looking northeast.

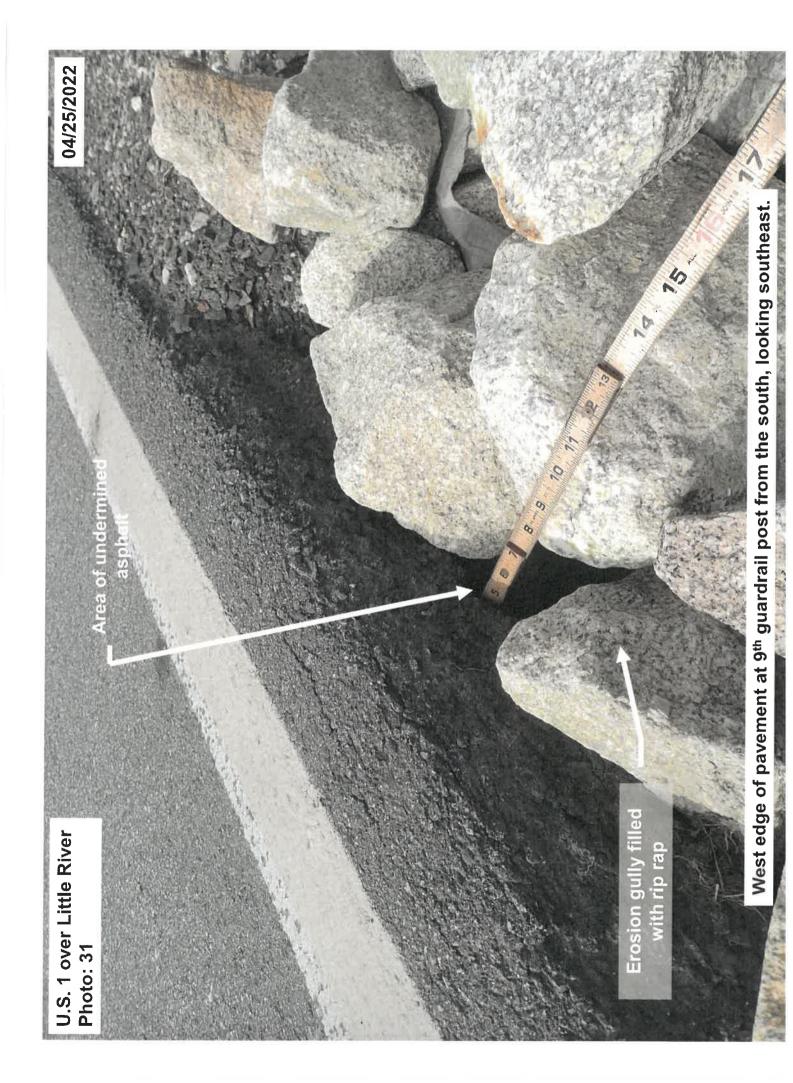
