Agenda Item 1:

Mr. Fuller called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

Agenda Item 2:

Mr McMorrin introduced the Wiggin Way Home Owners Association. The Assoc and Mr. Mcmorrin presented to the Water Commission a proposal that the Wiggin Way Assoc is attempting to convert over from their private water system to Aquarion as the water supplier for the homes in the Assoc.

In summary:

- Wiggin Way consists of 39 Homes relying on a small private community water system.
- Originally there were 3 production wells producing 30 gpm.
- 1 well was shut down due to high arsenic.
- 2 remaining wells produce 10 gpm.
- Arsenic levels have been increasing and have just tested over limit.

- NHDES has told Wiggin Way they have to improve water sources.
- Wiggin Way is proposing to connect their system to Aquarion at the Winterberry-Wiggin Way boundary.
- Required steps:
 - o Stratham Public Works has approved the concept.
 - o Working with the NHDES and NHDES supports the concept.
 - o Home Owners Association needs to approve concept.
 - o Stratham Planning Board approval required.
 - Stratham Select Board approval required.
 - o New Hampshire Public Utility Commission (PUC) approval required.
- Wiggins Way would turn infrastructure over to Aquarion and it would become an Aquarion asset.
- Aquarion would decommission production wells.

The North Hampton Water Commission had several concerns:

- Were all other options considered?
 - o Improve existing wells or drill new wells.
 - o Treatment for arsenic in existing system?
 - Cost estimate \$20,000 to install and \$2000-3,000/yr.
 - o Homes install individual wells?
- Aquarion not authorized to operate in Stratham.
 - o Potential expansion of Aquarion
 - o Increased demand of North Hampton water resources.
- If this ends up being approved:
 - o It is one time only and no further expansion is allowed.
 - All associated costs paid by Wiggin Way Assoc.
 - o This is not a precedent for any other hook-ups out of operating towns.

Mr. Fuller made a motion that if this does go before the NHPUC, the Water Commission will request intervenor status. Mr. Bettcher seconded the motion and the motion passed by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Fuller adjourned the meeting without objection at 8:15 pm.
